

OUR IMPACT

DRIVING LASTING IMPACT ACROSS COMMUNITIES

In FY'24, the project added

40,851 new households to our livelihood support programs, bringing the total to 1,35,000 households supported through our initiatives.

10,396 Farmer Entities, including 10,358 Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and 38 Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs), supported.

544 Entrepreneurs nurtured through our interventions.

BUILDING CAPACITIES FOR SUSTAINABLE GROWTH

In past year, we focused on enhancing the capacity of smallholder farmers through technical support:

- 99,248 Training Hours dedicated to strengthening the capacity of participants.
- 30 Training Topics covered across diverse areas such as animal husbandry, climate-smart agricultural, social capital, entrepreneurship, and financial literacy.
- 1,15,599 Participants equipped with skills and knowledge to enhance livelihoods and promote sustainable practices.

PATHWAYS TO A SUSTAINABLE INCOME

Through our technical support to the signature programs – Bihar Sustainable Livelihood Development (BSLD), Hatching Hope Initiative Phase 3, Hatching Hope Accelerating Income (HHAI), and Odisha Socio-Economic Development (OSED) – we are driving progress toward financial security:

- **38,479 Households** are on the pathway to achieving the Living Income Benchmark (LIB).
- **6,182 Households** have already reached the Living Income Benchmark (LIB).
- **1,895 Households** have gone beyond, achieving the Heifer's Sustainable Living Income (SLI).

*Living Income is the amount of money every person in a household needs per day to live a dignified life.

During the project design phase, we determine the living income gap the project needs to address by calculating benchmarks and actual income. Our approach is based on the Anker methodology and builds on the work of academics, international NGOs, and the Living Income Community of Practice to achieve agreed-upon standards. The living income benchmark calculation has been customized to capture the unique needs of Heifer International's project participants.

A) BIHAR

We provide technical support and strategic oversight to the Bihar Sustainable Livelihood Development Project (BSLD), enhancing the livelihoods of 71,000 small-scale farming families. Our role focuses on guiding key initiatives in livestock, crop, and vegetable value chains, aligned with Heifer's Values-Based Holistic Community Development Model and Market Strategies.

We strengthen market systems through Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs), enabling farmers to access services and broader markets, and empowering them to build resilient businesses. We also facilitate access to financial services and foster the development of micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs) for long-term sustainability.

We provide oversight, monitoring, and evaluation to 10 non-government organisations under the BSLD project ensuring the project's progress and supporting the transition to private sector partners for sustained impact.

ACHIEVEMENTS THAT MATTER: STORIES OF TRANSFORMATION BSLD

Sanju Devi's Journey: Empowerment through Social Capital

Three years ago, Sanju Devi's life changed when she joined the Bihar Sustainable Livelihood Development Project (BSLD), supported by Passing Gifts, a subsidiary of Heifer International. The program, focused on empowering smallholder farmers—particularly women—introduced Sanju to the potential of diversifying agriculture, especially through goat farming. Alongside technical training in livestock management, Sanju learned about Self-Help Group (SHG) management and participated in Passing Gifts' Cornerstone Training, which emphasizes collective strength, personal growth, and mutual support.

Initially uncertain about her journey, Sanju found encouragement and support from her husband. "When I decided to consider goat farming, he encouraged me to do so. I also decided to lease land for agriculture, and he supported me," she recalls. This partnership laid the foundation for her confidence, allowing her to take charge of household agricultural ventures, including goat farming and kitchen gardening, which had previously been managed solely by her husband.

Today, Sanju proudly reflects on her transformation. She has been recognized for her accomplishments, travelled to Patna for additional training, and become an influential member of her SHG. Recently, Sanju received the prestigious National-level CII Award for Women Leadership in Delhi, where she represented her Farmer Producer Organization (FPO) as a Board of Director. This honour highlights her leadership and the significant impact she's made in her community.

Sanju's journey exemplifies the power of social capital in driving change. Through the solidarity and support of her SHG and FPO, she reclaimed her agency, evolving from a homemaker to a confident entrepreneur. Her story inspires women in rural Bihar, showing how collective action and mutual support can empower them to take control of their futures and make a lasting impact.



Launch of National-Level Goat Livelihood Toolkit with GIZ Support

Passing Gifts, a subsidiary of Heifer International, developed the Goat Livelihood Toolkit under the ERADA project with GIZ support to enhance sustainable goat farming. This resource includes a Farmer's Handbook and Training Manual, providing best practices and strategies to strengthen goat-based livelihoods.

Launched at the national level, the toolkit supports BSLD interventions and expands impact through government collaboration.

The event featured key dignitaries, including Shri Sharwan Kumar (Hon'ble Minister, Rural Development, Govt. of Bihar), Dr. N. Vijaya Lakshmi, IAS (Principal Secretary, Animal & Fisheries Resources Department), Mr. Tarun Shridhar (Former Secretary, Dept. of Animal Husbandry, Govt. of India), and Surita Sandosham (President & CEO, Heifer International).





This milestone empowers smallholder farmers with scalable, sustainable solutions for the goat farming sector.



B) ODISHA

We provide strategic oversight and technical support to 10 local NGO partners for the Odisha Socio-Economic Development (OSED), Hatching Hope India Phase 3 (HHIP3), and Transformational Farm Output Risk Mitigation (TRANSFORM) projects. These initiatives focus on enhancing farmer livelihoods, improving agricultural and livestock practices, and promoting sustainability across Odisha. By strengthening market access, health management, and community empowerment, we support long-term economic growth and improved nutrition for smallholder farmers.



HATCHING HOPE INDIA PHASE 3 (HHIP3) INITIATIVE

The goal of the HHI P3 project is to improve the nutrition and livelihoods of 200,000 individuals through enhanced poultry production and consumption while reaching an additional 14 million people with awareness messages about poultry.


The desired outcomes of the project are to improve poultry farming livelihoods for 30,000 farmers, with better access to markets and services, increased incomes, and widespread awareness of the benefits of poultry consumption. Reducing flock mortality and promoting sustainable practices are also key objectives.


By June 2024, the project had engaged 40,212 participants across 3,629 SHGs. In FY'24 (July 2023 to June 2024), the project provided 2,856 hours of training to project participants to enhance their poultry farming skills. Additionally, 76 CAVE Kits and 172 Model Poultry Houses were distributed to bolster their capacity for poultry production.







ODISHA SOCIO-ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT (OSED) INITIATIVE

The OSED project aims to bridge the Living Income Gap for 30,000 smallholder goat farmers in Mayurbhanj and Keonjhar districts by 2026, utilizing Farmer-Owned Agri-Business (FOAB) models. The project's core objectives include increasing farmer incomes, improving access to finance, enhancing goat farming practices, and strengthening value chain integration. Additionally, the project focuses on social capital development, market linkages, and reducing goat mortality to ensure long-term sustainability for smallholders.

In Financial Year 2024

(July 2023 – June 2024), the project made significant progress:

30,077 participants engaged across 2,816 SHGs, delivering over 8,837 hours of training, including specialized animal management training for 113 youth.

368 bucks, 351 buck house sheds, and 154 two-wheelers distributed to enhance productivity and mobility.

Through our guidance and collaboration with NGO partners, the OSED project continues to empower farmers, improve livelihoods, and build a sustainable goat farming model for long-term success.

TRANSFORMATIONAL STRATEGIES FOR FARM OUTPUT RISK MITIGATION (TRANSFORM) INITIATIVE.

The TRANSFORM project, funded by USAID, is a five-year initiative led by Cargill Inc., Heifer International, and the International Poultry Council (IPC), operating in Odisha and Andhra Pradesh. It aims to improve animal agriculture by enhancing biosecurity, reducing antimicrobial use (AMU), and increasing productivity for 49,000 smallholder poultry farmers.



In FY'24, the project:

6,061

farmers engaged across 519 Self-Help Groups (SHGs), providing **4,432 hours of training** in biosecurity, farm management, and AMU practices.

97,201

farmers reached in Mayurbhanj through Social Behaviour Change Communication (SBCC) initiatives.

ACHIEVEMENTS THAT MATTER: STORIES OF TRANSFORMATION ODISHA

From Struggle to Success: Latarani Mahanta's Goat Farming Journey

In a remarkable transformation, Latarani Mahanta, a small-scale goat farmer from Khedapada village, has turned her struggles into success through resilience and hard work. Living with her husband, Sudam Charan Mohanta, and their two daughters, Latarani initially faced significant challenges in her goat farming venture. With a primary income from a small grocery store and her husband working as a migrant labourer, the family relied heavily on their herd of seven goats. However, frequent outbreaks of diseases like Peste des Petits Ruminants (PPR) severely impacted her livelihood.

Despite her best efforts to maintain hygiene and provide quality feed, Latarani experienced devastating losses. In one particularly bad year, she lost 60% of her herd to PPR, leading to high veterinary costs and diminishing milk production. Her business was on the brink of collapse.

The turning point came when Latarani attended an Improve Animal Management (IAM) training initiated under the Odisha Socio-Economic Development initiative organized by our local partner RVDO in the Harichandanpur block of Kendujhar district, Odisha. There, she learned about the benefits of a vaccination program that could protect her goats from common diseases. Initially hesitant due to the costs involved, she decided to participate in a government-subsidized vaccination initiative with guidance from RVDO.

The results were remarkable. Within a year of starting the vaccination program, Latarani noticed a significant reduction in disease outbreaks. The mortality rate in her herd dropped from over 30% to less than 5%. Healthier goats led to more offspring and increased milk production, which boosted her income. Five years after adopting the vaccination program,

Latarani's herd grew from 7 to 70 goats, and her annual income soared to ₹80,000–₹90,000. This financial success allowed her to expand her farm, build better housing for her goats, and even diversify into cheese production. Her husband now helps manage the farm instead of seeking work elsewhere.

"Vaccinating my goats was the best decision I made," Latarani reflects. "It not only saved my farm but transformed it into a thriving business."

Today, she serves as an inspiration to other farmers in the region, demonstrating how effective disease management can lead to sustainable success.

C) ANDHRA PRADESH

We conducted a Living Income Benchmark (LIB) study in Andhra Pradesh from June to September 2024. The study aimed to assess the Living Income required for a dignified life, focusing on the income gap families need to bridge to meet essential needs like food, housing, healthcare, education, and savings for resilience.

Data was gathered through interviews, group discussions, and a market survey across 14 mandals in six districts. This study is crucial for our ongoing efforts to foster economically vibrant, resilient communities, and brings us closer to our goal of building resilient communities.



HATCHING HOPE ACCELERATING INCOMES – BRIDGE TO SUSTAINABILITY INITIATIVE

In Andhra Pradesh, Hatching Hope Accelerating Incomes – Bridge to Sustainability initiatives targets 10,000 smallholder families involved in backyard poultry farming across Sri Sathya Sai, Anantapur, and Alluri Seetharama Raju districts. Through collaboration with eight Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs), the project focuses on improving income and resilience for these farmers, harnessing the power of collective farming and enhanced market access.

The project has emphasized strengthening coordination with Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) to enhance their capacity and effectiveness. These eight FPOs serve as key drivers for sustainable poultry production, facilitating access to markets, financial services, and technical support for smallholder farmers across 472 villages in the designated districts. Regular engagement, training, and alignment with government and stakeholder priorities have ensured that FPOs remain integral to achieving the project's goals.

ENHANCING SOCIAL IMPACT FOR POVERTY ELIMINATION IN ANDHRA PRADESH

The Society for Elimination of Rural Poverty (SERP), a state government-owned organization, is a key partner in Andhra Pradesh that recognizes Heifer's work and is expanding the Hatching Hope Accelerating Incomes (HHAI) project to other districts. This expansion uses an FPO-centric approach, aiming for more efficient and effective improvement of smallholder livelihoods.

The HHAI project, which began by focusing on backyard poultry (BYP) as a profitable value chain, aims to build business capacities and improve farmers' incomes through the BYP value chain approach. In collaboration with SERP, the initiative is being expanded to other districts in Andhra Pradesh. The key activities include strengthening

BYP, building capacity, and creating business plans that will attract financing to scale operations and infrastructure.

The project targets training 1,000 farmers across 4 districts in bio-secure poultry management practices. These farmers will receive loans from SERP (INR 40,000 per coop) to establish biosecurity-compliant chicken coops, which will improve productivity and profitability.

Since the project's inception in FY'24, 42 Active Participant Households have been identified, 64 Village Organization Assistants (19 male, 45 female) have undergone 5 hours of training, and 20 farmers (8 male, 12 female) have received 6 hours of training on Brooding Management.



ACHIEVEMENTS THAT MATTER: STORIES OF TRANSFORMATION ANDHRA PRADESH

Thriving Entrepreneurs Transform Poultry Farming in Andhra Pradesh

In the tribal village of Jagarampalli, nestled in Andhra Pradesh's Alluri Sitarama Raju District, Somalamma, a once-marginalized woman, has become a catalyst for change through poultry farming. Frequent outbreaks of diseases like Newcastle disease and Fowl Pox made poultry farming a precarious livelihood for villagers. Many, like Somalamma, struggled with high mortality rates among their birds, leading to unstable incomes and ongoing hardships.

Everything changed in 2022 when Somalamma joined the Community Agrovet Entrepreneur (CAVE) program under Heifer International's TRANSFORM project. The program provided training on vaccinations, biosecurity, and animal health management, equipping her with tools to combat these challenges effectively. Armed with her new knowledge, Somalamma began offering vaccination services and biosecurity advice to her neighbours, significantly reducing disease outbreaks and improving poultry productivity.

Her efforts paid off quickly. Within six months, farmers in her village saw a 50% reduction in poultry mortality rates and a corresponding 30% increase in productivity, as measured by improved egg production and chick survival. Kameswara Rao, the

local Animal Husbandry Assistant, confirmed this improvement, noting the dramatic drop-in mortality rates.

Beyond the village, word of Somalamma's expertise spread to neighbouring communities, where she expanded her impact. She began traveling to other villages, offering vaccinations, consultations, and even selling quality poultry feed—a service long missing in the area. Farmers in villages like Tallapalem praised her efforts, citing healthier flocks and steadier incomes as a direct result of her guidance.

Thanks to her work, Somalamma's monthly income has grown from ₹3,000 to ₹8,000, enabling her to provide better education and nutrition for her children. Her success has inspired other women in her community to join the CAVE program, fostering a wave of entrepreneurship and social change.

Today, Somalamma is one of 79 CAVEs in Andhra Pradesh, collectively transforming the lives of 2,314 farmers by promoting sustainable practices and reducing the risk of zoonotic diseases. Her journey demonstrates the power of opportunity and resilience, proving that one person's efforts can uplift an entire community.

LIVESTOCK TECHNOLOGY AND ONE HEALTH

Woah Recognises PGPL's Contributions

World Organization for Animal Health (WOAH) has recognised Passing Gifts for its contributions in developing WOAH's Competency and Curriculum Guidelines for Community Animal Health Workers (CAHWs), in which the Livestock Technology and One Health (LTOH) team of PGPL was integral part of the reviewing processes of the draft curriculum document in several online meetings, online surveys as well as filled up WOAH's Curriculum Alignment Matrix (CAM) Tool.

The Curriculum Alignment Matrix (CAM) is a tool which allowed us to compare our (PGPL's) Community Agro Veterinary Entrepreneurs (CAVEs) training programme against the WOAH (OIE) Curriculum Recommendations include the Modules, Units, and Learning Outcomes; the Learning Outcomes are the unit of comparison for determining programme alignment to determine its alignment, or "match" with these standards.

The exercise revealed that most of the Learning Outcomes of PGPL's CAVEs training programme are in alignment with the WOAH's (OIE) Curriculum Learning Outcomes. Moreover, WOAH appreciated the contents on Biosecurity Measures taught in CAVEs training programme organised by PGPL and thus WOAH has included the biosecurity components in its new CAHW curriculum guidelines. This guideline would be used worldwide for training and developing CAHWs under the legal framework of the respective countries.



ACHIEVEMENTS THAT MATTER: STORIES OF TRANSFORMATION

Gunja Devi: From Homemaker to Respected Animal Health Leader

Gunja Das, a homemaker from Kudhani Block, Muzaffarpur, Bihar, dreamed of breaking free from her limited income supporting her husband's small laddu business. In 2020, her aspirations took shape when the Bihar Sustainable Livelihood Development (BSLD) Project, implemented by Pragati Gramin Vikas Samiti (PGVS) and supported by Passing Gifts reached her community.

As a member of a Self-Help Group (SHG), Gunja's dedication caught the attention of project facilitator Kiran Kumari. Recognizing her potential, the SHG and Project Monitoring Committee selected Gunja for Community Agro-Veterinary Entrepreneur training. In November 2021, she underwent rigorous training in animal healthcare, learning essential skills like deworming, vaccinations, zoonotic disease prevention, and biosecurity practices.

Initially, Gunja faced scepticism as she travelled to 20 villages, delivering services and educating farmers. Undeterred by criticism, her consistent efforts gradually earned her the community's trust.

With our continued support, Gunja purchased a scooter through a grant and loan, significantly expanding her reach. She also established a medical shop with project funding. Today, she earns approximately ₹17,000 monthly, combining income from animal healthcare services and her shop.

Her growing expertise garnered recognition from the Animal Husbandry Department (AHD), which now hires her as a vaccinator. Additionally, organizations like Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK) and ICICI Foundation engage her to train aspiring CAVEs, paying ₹3,000 per day. Her advisory role with KVK underscores her leadership in the sector.

Gunja's success has transformed her family's life, enabling her to provide her daughter with quality education in an English-medium school. Reflecting on her journey, she shares:



"I never imagined becoming a respected leader in my community. BSLD project helped me turn my dreams into reality. My life has changed in income, respect, and recognition, and I am committed to helping others create hope in our community."

Gunja's inspiring transformation from homemaker to recognized animal health service provider is a testament to the power of determination and the right support.


